
July 1, 2022- September 30, 2022



IN THE NEWS



Not only is September a busy time with back-to-school events, but September is also Suicide Awareness Month. According to the Oregon Health Authority, although significant progress has been made over the last few years, <u>Oregon's youth suicide rate is still considerably higher than the rest</u> of the nation.

As our students, teachers, and administrators return to the classroom, SafeOregon is there to help.

- SafeOregon participated in several suicide awareness walks to promote the tip line as a resource to report concerns about a student's well-being if unsure about who to tell.
- Marion County Health & Human Services highlighted SafeOregon in their monthly <u>Health</u> <u>Promotion and Prevention Pieces</u> Newsletter.
- Eastern Oregon's Inter-Mountain Educational Service District worked with school administrators and law enforcement officials to lead a conversation around school safety, including the importance of the SafeOregon tip line.



Calling all Parents who have kids in Oregon's Schools.

When your kids get home from school, ask them if they know about SafeOregon. If they say they have never heard of it, share this information with them.

SafeOregon is a school safety tip line that is available 24/7 for students, parents, teachers, or community members to confidentially or anonymously report a threat that may directly affect a student or school's safety.

SafeOregon is open to all public (k-12) schools, private schools, and colleges within the State of Oregon, with 1,239 schools currently enrolled in the program serving over 530,000 students.

Community Spotlight: Safe Oregon Tip Line for School Safety



Mental Health is a big topic of conversation in our community. Youth in particular are reporting high stress and anxiety and are concerned about violence in schools. Safe Oregon was created with the goal of helping students feel safe in school by providing a confidential way to report safety concerns. Safe Oregon Coordinator, Lisa Miller shares more information below.

What is Safe Oregon?

Safe Oregon is a school safety tip line that students, parents, and other community members can use to anonymously report and share information regarding potential threats to student safety. These safety concerns may be about their school, friends or even themselves.



Sometimes students need help from an adult at school and they are not sure who to tell. The reporting is confidential, so youth don't have to worry about their name being shared There are several ways to submit a tip: They can call, text, email or report on the website. There is even a mobile app. Specially trained staff are available 24-hours-aday, 365-days-a-year to receive these tips.

Tip Level Designations

Critical - Involves an immediate or imminent threat such as weapon possession on campus, planned school attack, or self-reporting related to suicide. *Response: Immediate phone call to school and law enforcement.*

Urgent - Involves violence, self-harm, or criminal activity that recently occurred and/or at high risk of occurring in the near future. Response: Immediate phone call to consult with school regarding urgent matter that may involve law enforcement (such as online postings of suicide ideation or school threats).

Standard - Reported behavior that is consistent with regular peer to peer interaction, school rule violations, etc. where neither students nor the school has been harmed. *Response: School POC's are notified via email.*

Other - Tips not related to safety of students, staff, or schools. Response: Informational email as needed.
